PROGRAMS ON PEACE & POLITICS SPARK **DEBATES AND DIALOGUE AT I-HOUSE**

esidents, alumni, and community members are filling I-House to capacity for an expanded schedule of high-profile events focusing on peace and politics worldwide. Prominent officials, activists, artists, authors and academics have shared insights

on their work to promote peace, and, combined with public screenings of U.S. Presidential Debates and Election Night results, have sparked dialogue on a range of global challenges.

Officials Provide Perspective

President Michelle Bachelet of Chile spoke to a standing-room only crowd at I-House in June as part of her UC Berkeley visit exploring green technologies for energy independence. "In contrast to the 1960s and 1990s, Chile has not come here to ask for aid," President Bachelet told the audience..."[but] to

form an association between Chile and California as part of a new relationship." Following her I-House remarks, which also addressed her unique status as the first woman to be elected to the Chilean Presidency, Chancellor Robert Birgeneau presented Batchelet with the Berkeley Medal, the campus's highest honor.

Congressman Tom Campbell was the featured speaker at a resident-alumni Lodestar Dinner held two days after the elections. The former Congressman, current professor, and former Dean of the Haas Business School, attracted 200 attendees who appreciated hearing his insights on the topic: What the U.S. Election Results Mean for America and the World.

Elections Spur Discussions

U.S. Elections and speculation about ground-breaking firsts in the Presidential and Vice-Presidential contests fueled active participation in the House's public screenings of Presidential Debates and Election Night Coverage, where residents engaged in vigorous discussions and debate with a panel of resident and expert commentators.

Kennedy Family member Bobby Shriver came to I-House in October to address debt relief and AIDS in Africa and the lessons he has learned by uniting politicians, celebrities,

corporations, and governments around the world in innovative ways.

Professor George Lakoff discussed his book, The Political Mind: Why You Can't Understand 21st Century American Politics with an 18th Century Brain in September.

Jim Berk, filmmaker and producer of An Inconvenient Truth and Syriana, addressed the topic of Film and Media as Tools for Social Change in October.



joined co-authors Ellie Hipol Luis and Lillian Galedo to reflect on the lives of Filipino immigrants at a September program. Speakers discussed the hardships, achievements, and activism of Filipino immigrants and their families.

Professor Daniel Kammen, UC energy and resources expert, addressed Climate Change and Peace in September and explained the work of the Nobel Prize winning Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change.

RESIDENTS COMPLETE PEACE PROJECTS

In the summer of 2008 four I-House residents completed international Peace Projects, each made possible by \$10,000 awards from Kathryn Wasserman Davis, a 1931-32 alumna of I-House New York, which graciously facilitated the peace grants.





Recipients shared stories of their adventures at the October I-House Resident Sunday Supper. Ana Teresa Villareal from Mexico reports, "I think the most important outcomes of my project are the friendships that were started among children from different nationalities and the development of their own interest in going to school and learning each other's language." Her Peace Camp in Cambodia promoted friendship among Cambodian and Vietnamese children in a town where communities were historically at odds.

By promoting cross-cultural play as a means for teaching tolerance, Villareal's initiative eased some of the tensions and cleared the way for healing through bilingual education in the context of sports and friendship. Over 200 children from both communities enrolled in a four-weekend football, volleyball, and art camp with one condition: to sign up, each child had to find a partner from the other

NAVIGATING ACROSS CULTURES: BRIDGES TO OPPORTUNITY

I was once counseled to wear a tie so people would conclude that the I-House Executive Director is a serious person. Anyone who caught a glimpse of me at our fall orientation retreat as I trembled on a steel cable suspended between two redwoods would have concluded otherwise even if I had been clad in a tuxedo!

The activity was designed to demonstrate the importance of community. Frankly, the challenge looked impossible: two residents start from opposite ends, each clinging to a shaky lifeline which they exchange as they try to move past each other on the rope. There is no way to accomplish this gracefully and there is no way to accomplish it without the help of newfound friends who are lined along both sides of the rope to sustain and encourage. My turn came: "Hey, Martin would you like to go?"

I replied with great exaggeration, trying not to reveal my hesitancy, "Of course!" It was only when I was virtually horizontal, yet still on the cable, that I fully realized the beauty of allowing the I-House community to sustain me.

The rope walk provides an apt metaphor for I-House. Our experience of learning to move across cultures with respect and understanding is not a solo endeavor but the fruit of many interactions within a supportive community. We learn to trust and accept. No need for a tie.

The grace our residents demonstrate in navigating the challenges of crossing cultures is remarkable – even as they open new worlds of possibility for themselves and others through this path. This newsletter profiles the stories of many with such grace: Peace Project scholars (pg. 1), Sustainability Interns (pg. 3), Alumna of the Year Chitra Divakaruni (pg. 5), the founder of the Blum Center for Developing Economies, and I-House residents working with the Blum Center (pg. 5).

A former resident, Denny Gulick, now a Math professor, wrote to me recently about his warm memories of I-House in the early 1960s, observing

Nowadays, when the world is being split apart by nationalism and strife and misunderstanding, it is ever more important for young people of all cultures to be able to fraternize, understand, and appreciate each other.

This truth was honored when Denny and I joined with hundreds of guests and friends this September to remember Denny's late aunt, the remarkable Betsy Bacon, who was a devoted champion of I-House through decades of service (pg. 5). Thank you to those who leave I-House with the tolerance, respect, understanding, and international friendship that form the foundation of a more peaceful world.

CAMPUS CAMPAIGN KICKS-OFF

UC Berkeley has announced a ground-breaking campaign with a \$3 billion dollar fundraising goal that represents the largest ever for a public university. The Campaign for Berkeley kick-off for fundraising and alumni relations staff was held at International House on September 9, just prior to a week of public and private events to highlight the aims of the campaign. Says Chancellor Robert Birgeneau, "We seek to raise \$3 billion over the next five years to attract and retain the country's most distinguished faculty, expand opportunities for

exceptional students, support creative collaborations needed to solve pressing world issues, and strengthen UC Berkeley's core mission to serve the societal good." The campaign will involve all of the campus's 14 schools and colleges and numerous departments. Although I-House is a separate non-profit with 501(c)3 status, gifts made during the 2008 – June, 2013 campaign timeline which are directed to I-House and credited through the UC Berkeley Foundation will be included in campaign tallys and entitle donors to Campaign giving benefits.

The "Thanks to Berkeley..." campaign theme enables the broad Cal community to share individual stories that together paint a portrait of the tremendous pride and gratitude so many have for Cal's impact on creating opportunities, transforming lives and shaping a better world. Funds raised will also close the funding gap between UC Berkeley and its elite private peers, which have grown large endowments, and use them, in part, to compete for the nation's top students and professors. GRANT SUPPORTS I-HOUSE "GREENING" PROJECTS

A recent grant from the Chancellor's Advisory Committee on Sustainability is helping I-House become more "green" and sustainable. Funding will compensate two student interns each working five hours a week to research, promote, and evaluate I-House projects to reduce energy, water and food waste, increase recycling, and heightened awareness of sustainability issues and practices.

Student interns, Aman Goyal, an environmental engineering grad student from India and Wanyi Zhao, a public policy grad student from China, will also work in conjunction with the campus Advisory Committee on Sustainability and the new UC Vice Chancellor for Sustainability Lisa McNeilly, in order to promote best practices from residence halls and other universities with similar initiatives. Campus recently committed to reducing its greenhouse gas emissions to 1990 levels by the year 2014.

"I'm looking forward to determining things like how many gallons of water or kilowatthours of energy are used per resident each month," says Aman. Wanyi says, "Together we'll work with residents to promote messages around sustainable practices and create goals with fun incentives to inspire and measure change...we can't wait to get

"trayless dining" in August, eliminating trays used for carrying plates in the I-House dining hall. Just two months after the project's inception, Director of Dining Services, Gary Beitch, estimates that food waste has decreased by approximately 30% and kitchen use of hot water has decreased by more than 12,000 gallons per week by not washing trays.

Greg Rodolari, Director of Physical Operations, reports that recycling practices at the House have expanded to include collection of printer cartridges, cell phones, batteries, electronic devices, and clothing. He also cites a recent donation of 600 compact florescent light bulbs which Aman and Wanyi will help ensure residents install to replace less efficient standard bulbs in student desk lamps.

"Most of us came to I-House in hopes of learning to understand and help solve global challenges," says Green Team and Resident Council member, Bret Strogen, a Ph.D. student in environmental engineering. "At I-House we have a strong calling to live lighter on the earth. It is important to remember that today more than one billion members of our global community lack clean water, energy, food, and sanitation. Learning to be conscious of natural resources, and to appreciate how much we rely on them, is a first step."

Through these efforts I-House hopes to improve conservation and recycling activities at I-House while educating residents on sustainability practices they can share in their home communities around the world.



ATHLETIC CENTER WILL BE NORTH OF I-HOUSE

Construction to begin as early as January

Soon after tree-sitters gave up a 21-month protest to impede the removal of trees north of I-House in September, University officials announced plans to speed up repairs to Memorial Stadium and launch construction of the Student-Athlete High Performance Center. Phase I of the project includes construction of the \$140 million center beginning as early as January, slated for completion in 2011. Phase II is retrofitting and modernizing the stadium's west side and is expected to be completed in 2014.

I-House Physical Operations Director Greg Rodolari says, "We are in close contact

with the campus through the planning and construction processes and together we are aiming to minimize impact on I-House residents. The Athletics Department has been helpful in making presentations at I-House so everyone understands the process."

"Ultimately, we hope the House's prominence next to such a popular venue should increase interest in and awareness of our mission and programs," says Development Director Shanti Corrigan.

A WISH FULFILLED!

Alum Donates Projector and Screen

An anonymous alumnus recently granted a wish from the "Resident Wish List" (see below) included in our last newsletter. Residents had asked for a quality screen and film projector that would enhance the House's capacity to screen cross-cultural films. After several meetings to select the most appropriate equipment, a state-of-theart screen and high resolution projector with long range lens were installed in November 2008. The new equipment will replace a screen damaged by years of heavy use and enable high-definition screenings in the Chevron Auditorium of films on Blu-ray disc format. "For the first time, I-House will be able to use our projector booth at the rear of the Auditorium to show high resolution films," says Tim Lynch, Events Manager. "After years of hoping we'd have this kind of technology, I'm thrilled that our residents' wishes were fulfilled with this generous gift." The Resident Council is planning a film series in the spring to make use of this much-appreciated new resource.

KARL PISTER SPEAKS AT 65TH ANNIVERSARY OF CALLAGHAN HALL

From 1943-1945, International House was rented to the Navy and renamed Callaghan Hall. Between 800 and 900 students in the V-12 Navy College Training Program then lived in the House while completing their degrees before being commissioned into the Navy and Marine Corps. During this era, the traditional I-House community moved to several fraternity houses.

Callaghan Hall alumni gathered at I-House for an afternoon tea on July 31 to celebrate the 65th anniversary of Callaghan Hall. Dr. Karl Pister, who lived in Callaghan Hall, was the guest speaker. He is a former

Professor and Dean of Cal's College of Engineering and Chancellor Emeritus of UC Santa Cruz.

Dr. Pister unveiled a plaque commemorating Callaghan Hall that states:

"International House honors the service of these men to forge a world in which the spirit of brotherhood and the principles of I-House might be renewed."

ALUMNI GATHER IN WASHINGTON DC

Karl Landstrom, who lived in the House during its inaugural year in 1930 (see photo pg. 6), attended the Washington DC reception in May and recalled, "My year at I-House influenced me toward observing equality with others of different backgrounds in a lifetime involving various kinds of organizational and social relationships."

"There are so many of us – 'The Ghosts of I-House Past' – who are gathered behind you, cheering and urging your continued success," remarked Alumna Joan Williams Hoover (IH1949-53) at the gathering of nearly fifty I-House alumni held in Washington D.C.'s International Student House in May.

The reception allowed former residents spanning 1930-2007 to connect with one another and to reminisce about their individual experiences of I-House. Martin Brennan, who hosted the event, recalls, "The vibrant emotional attachment to the House through every decade was palpable. It was very moving to see how quickly we came together as family with I-House as the catalyst."

Two hundred and fifty guests gathered for the 20th Annual Celebration and Awards Gala on April 16, 2008, honoring author Chitra Divakaruni as the *Alumna of the Year* and Richard Blum as *Global Citizen of the* Year

Chitra Divakaruni (IH 1978-79), award-winning author and poet, was honored for her work promoting cross-cultural understanding through her best-selling books and her work to combat violence against women in India and the US.

The night featured remarks from both honorees as well as performances by talented I-House residents who closed the evening with a lively Bhangra dance. The event raised more than \$90,000 to benefit the House and its work in fostering crosscultural respect and understanding.

REMEMBERING BETSY BACON

Betsy Bade Bacon, Residence Director of International House for 27 years, passed away peacefully in Berkeley on May 30, 2008, surrounded by her loving family.

Friends, family, and alumni gathered at International House on September 14 for a celebration of Betsy Bacon's life.

Executive Director Martin Brennan noted that Betsy did so much to make I-House a home for thousands of students, "The I-House family is grateful for the gift of Betsy Bacon."

W. Sheridan Warrick, Executive Director Emeritus who worked with Betsy for a quarter century, recalled that Betsy loved the residents of I-House. "In her reserved but gracious and insightful ways, Betsy Bade Bacon was a major figure at I-House and in the campus community. She was filled with spirit for International House and for all that it represents."

Upon her retirement, Betsy said, "Meeting people from all over the world went along with my own education and interests. I really feel it's a privilege to work in such a unique and interesting environment." She served as Residence Director at International House from 1957 to 1968 and again from 1974 to 1989. Years later, she was frequently greeted warmly by alumni who were grateful for her assistance and support. On the day before she entered the hospital, a man came up to her at the de Young Museum and expressed his gratitude for her help in finding a room for him at I-House.

Mr. Warrick recalled that he had suggested to Betsy that she write her memoirs but she declined, in typical Betsy manner, saying, "I enjoy the past, but I revel in the present."

Betsy grew up in Berkeley and in San Diego, graduated from Pomona College (1945), and pursued graduate work in history at UCLA. Her lifelong interest in people from other cultures was inspired by a year spent circumnavigating the world by ship and living on her father's archaeological dig in 1935 in what was then Palestine. Betsy's extensive travels began with a 1000 mile bicycle trip through war-torn Europe in 1949. She enjoyed camping, hiking, skiing, and playing the flute and was an avid member of the Sierra Club. For the past five years, she served on the Advisory Board of The Bade Museum of Biblical Archaeology in Berkeley.

Betsy was devoted to her family. At the service, nieces and nephews recalled the special trips she arranged and her determination to teach them to ski, no matter how severe the weather might be.

In 1968, Betsy married Wilbur Bacon, a Foreign Service expert with experience in Korea. Wilbur passed away in 1973. Betsy is survived by her brother, Cal Professor William G. Bade and his wife Eleanor of Berkeley and nieces and nephews. The family suggests donations to International House or to the Bade Museum of Biblical Archaeology at the Pacific School of Religion.

A bench in front of I-House will be dedicated to Betsy Bacon thanks to a generous memorial gift from Al Garren.

I-House alumnus Mason Gaffney, originally from New York, speaks from experience when discussing "outdated laws that deny marriage between consenting adults." His wedding to his I-House sweetheart, Estelle Lau, from Hawaii, was impossible until they, as close followers of the 1948 Perez v. Sharpe legal case in California, benefitted from this historic ruling to legalize inter-racial marriage in California. Recently, Mason and Estelle's son, Stuart, filed an amicus brief to the California Supreme Court with his life partner John Lewis, which was ultimately part of the Court's ruling to legalize samesex marriage.

"It has taken us 21 years to get to our wedding day," says Stuart Gaffney. "My Mom and Dad, an inter-racial couple, were only able to marry in California thanks to a decision 60 years ago that overturned a state law banning interracial couples from marrying. We take a lot of inspiration from my mom and dad."

Mason and Estelle joined Stuart and John to celebrate their June 17th marriage, one day after the California Supreme Court overturned the state's same-sex marriage ban. Says Mason, "In his recent majority opinion, the California Chief Justice followed the argument of Stuart and John's brief, and based his ruling on the precedent of Perez v. Sharpe," the same ruling that made it possible for Mason and Estelle to marry in 1952. Mason continues, "Indirectly, with a little effort but not too much straining, you could trace this ruling back to I-House."


