I am an incoming PhD student in the Geography Department with a B.A. in Urban Studies and a B.S. in Conservation & Resource Studies. My research will be conducted under the Moorea IDEA, a multi-university initiative working to advance the complex systems modeling process as well as drive policy on Moorea.
