Preserving the Past Preparing for the Future

During the sad but necessary closure of I-House due to health and safety concerns caused by the pandemic, our volunteer House Committee of the Board of Directors and staff have been working tirelessly to address the needs of today and of the future with respect, care, and appreciation for the historical significance of the building.

Preserving the look and feel of our architectural treasure while reimagining safety and security requirements, accessibility, functionality, and ambiance has necessitated new policies, procedures, building renovation and remodeling projects, and countless innovations large and small.

COVID-19 precipitated the need to rethink how we promote community and connection—the lifeblood of the I-House "recipe"—within the physical and behavioral constraints inherent in safety, social distancing, and space utilization choices.

The question "What else can be made touchless?" led to many improvements such as touchless bathroom fixtures, sinks, soap and towel dispensers, hand sanitizer stations, and the

installation of card entry systems instead of old fashioned keys throughout the house. Plexiglass shields were installed at the Front Desk and Dining Commons reception area to protect residents, staff, and student workers from airborne transmission of the virus.

The wrenching decision to limit public access due to health concerns has impacted our current ability to provide the hallmark welcoming environment for dining guests, event participants, and returning alumni and friends. Everyone entering the building must be masked and present a completed green "daily symptom screener" badge to the Front Desk before being allowed entry. This is a campus-wide requirement designed



to limit the spread of the virus. We love welcoming back alumni and friends. If you wish to visit, we ask only that you kindly contact us in advance so we may ensure everyone's safety.

One of the most important considerations for safely reopening I-House has been revising cleaning and disinfection protocols, and reconfiguring rooms. In addition to researching and bringing in new tools and cleaning systems to address the pandemic, Custodial Manager Mary Cinko and Director of Physical Operations Mark Cassettari and their teams have continued to keep the house in beautiful shape, despite recurring layers of dust needing to be removed as renovations and remodeling projects have been managed and completed.

Adding to the complexity of completing these improvements, Mary and Mark have successfully addressed more than the usual contractor and vendor challenges, supply chain interruptions, and impacts of limited staffing during the closure.

The timing of the relocation of the Berkeley International Office (BIO) offices from I-House to other space in Berkeley turned out to be fortuitous as it allowed I-House to renovate and to designate the 2nd floor as an isolation floor in the event of COVID-19 infection. Importantly, we added a wheelchair lift to make the second floor ADA accessible. Making the required building updates during the temporary closure was indeed one of the primary reasons why we were able to have the confidence to open to a full house of residents this year. Among the changes made to the 2nd floor are a separate entrance with restricted access, provisions for supplying food, coordination with health care workers, and a process of frequent communication between staff and impacted residents.

In collaboration with the UC Berkeley Graduate Division, International House holds a competition for one-year awards for first-year or continuing graduate students in a doctoral program at UC Berkeley. Priority preference is given to new incoming graduate students, and only those with financial need are eligible.

Award recipients receive one academic year of single-occupancy room and board at International House, fees and tuition paid by the student's academic department, and a \$5,000 stipend from the University of California Graduate Division. To be considered for one of these awards, applicants must be admitted to UC Berkeley for the coming academic year, able to reside in a single-occupancy room at International House, and nominated by their academic department; or they may apply directly with the support of their department.

Allan & Kathleen Rosevear Gateway Fellowship

This Gateway Fellowship was established in 2007 by International House alumnus Allan Rosevear (IH 1960-62) and his wife, Kathy. With priority consideration for students in physics or astrophysics, the award may also be made for students in the sciences. If no student meets the above criteria, the award may be given to any entering or continuing doctoral student with demonstrated financial need, of U.S. and/or international origin. Originally from Cincinnati, Ohio, Mr. Rosevear earned his master's degree in physics in 1962 at UC

Berkeley under the Chairmanship of Carl Helmholz. Mr. Rosevear lived at I-House for two years, forming friendships with students from around the world.



This year, the Rosevears have opened the doors of opportunity for Kyle Ritchie from the U.S. Kyle is a second-year Ph.D. student studying high energy theoretical physics.

Kyle writes,

"Like many others from New Mexico, I come from a family of mixed, largely Hispanic, background, which has

resided in New Mexico for generations.

"One of my ambitions, in addition to becoming a professional researcher in physics, is to give back to my community by providing serious learning and research opportunities to the many students who have interests and aspirations in physics and science like I do, but haven't historically had access to the same great opportunities that I've had."

Raphael Rodriguez-Golden Age Fellowship (RRGA)

Established in 1989, the Rafael Rodriguez-Golden Age Fellowship was a model for the Gateway Fellowship program. Recipients are selected annually by the Dean of UC Berkeley's Graduate Division after faculty input. This fellowship was made possible by the generosity of I-House alumni from the "Golden Age" (1946-1952), who created the fellowship in honor of fellow alumnus Rafael Rodriguez (IH 1946-50) of Costa Rica. The fund provides for a full room and board grant for one international student from an underserved country pursuing a P.h.D. Such a student may lack the financial resources to come to Cal, yet is deemed likely to benefit from and to contribute to life at I-House.



We are pleased to announce this year's Raphael Rodriguez-Golden Age Fellow, Hyunsuk Kim from South Korea. Hyunsuk writes,

"As Korea is relatively a homogenous country, I haven't had much experience encountering people from diverse backgrounds. I am really looking forward to meeting new people here and

exchanging cultures with each other.

"Through five years of the Ph.D. program, I am looking forward to integrating many fields into my research. I am currently interested in statistics, but whatever topic I choose for my research, I will try my best to have a positive impact on the world."

Named Scholarships

We have both international and domestic scholarship opportunities at I-House. In addition to annual and recurring gifts to the I-House Scholarship fund, named scholarships are made possible by major and legacy gifts and pledges from donors and alumni who want to give back and "pay it forward."

The University Section Club I-House Scholarship Fund

The University Section Club, a non-profit UC Berkeley support group, was founded in 1927 with the following mission:

- To provide service to the University Community;
- To raise funds to aid deserving students, support studentrelated groups, and foster scholarship and international understanding; and
- To provide a social milieu for members to interact while sharing common interests in the various activity sections of the Club.

The UC Berkeley Section Club is a group of faculty spouses and community volunteers who are dedicated to helping foreign students adjust to a new environment and to make their stay easy and comfortable. The Club and I-House have been partners in service to foreign students at Berkeley for many years. The scholarship supports both foreign and American students who demonstrate financial need. The endowed Section Club I-House Scholarship Fund, made possible by donations of the Club's generous members, helps one or two grad students with room and board at I-House each year.



This year's University Section Club I-House Scholar is Cesar Rojas Angel, a journalist and political science professional from Bogotá, Colombia.

"At UC Berkeley, I plan to go deep in my skills as an investigation reporter and gather the tools to become a documentalist. After this unique experience, I plan to work as a

correspondent for international media as a non-fiction filmmaker. I also speak French and I've been practicing it with my French and African neighbors at I-House.

"I would like to connect with people from around the world interested in the same issues, no matter if they are journalists, lawyers, engineers, or scientists. As a journalist, my job is to tell stories, but above all, I want to listen and understand."

Sheridan (Sherry) and Betsey Warrick Scholarship Endowment

This fund was established by the Board of Directors in 1987 in honor of the retirement of Sherry Warrick, after 26 years as Executive Director of I-House. It continues to be supported generously by alumni and friends of I-House in honor of both Betsey's and Sherry's lives and service to I-House. Sheridan and Betsey Warrick Scholarship Endowment pays tribute to their love of music and is awarded to an international or U.S. resident with preference given to music majors.



Chinatsu Kato from Nagoya, Japan, is a recipient of the Sheridan and Betsey Warrick Scholarship this year. She is majoring in global studies and is interested in studying more about Asian development, especially East Asia and how its interactions with other countries affect the world. In her free time, she loves to play the violin, knit, and read. She hopes to

work in the United Nations someday.

"I feel that there is a wall between countries, and these countries are competing rather than cooperating. Under such a difficult time, the value of living in I-House, where people can live in harmony as one, where all the international students come together and share their stories, values, and faith, is more important than ever before."

C.H. Ramsden Scholarship

Named in honor of **Charles Ramsden (IH 1931-32)**, this scholarship assists students who are U.S. citizens only with a preference given to undergraduates and those majoring in the sciences, engineering, or economics.

Mark Ross Scholarship

Mark Ross was born in Harbin, China, and attended UC Berkeley. After World War II, he founded an export trading firm and was active in promoting trade between the U.S. and Pacific Rim countries. This scholarship, funded by The Mark Ross Foundation of San Francisco, provides one or more room and board grants for students in significant financial need who are either U.S. citizens or permanent residents.

Each year these scholarships are awarded to multiple residents.

I-House is delighted to continue our collaboration with the UC Berkeley Center for African Studies in partnership with The Mastercard Foundation Scholars Program to help prepare the next generation of African leaders. The Scholars Program aims "to develop a cohort of ethical, entrepreneurial, and energetic young leaders who will drive and lead socioeconomic transformation in Africa." At UC Berkeley, the Program has provided support to over 120 undergraduate and master's degree students from 2012 to 2020. This year, we are

pleased to have sixteen Mastercard Foundation Scholars living and learning at I-House.

I-House has added value to the experiences and opportunities that MasterCard Foundation Scholars enjoy at UC Berkeley. For example, while I-House's services center on the provision of residential rooms, meals, and educational experiences for students and scholars, intercultural programs are provided annually for residents at discounted rates and fees, partially funded by philanthropic support. In non-pandemic times, these include ethnic celebrations and festivals, culturally themed coffee hours, field trips, home stays, lecture and film series, social dances, and debates, in addition to traditional "Sunday Suppers" featuring resident performances. Staff members organize social gatherings to integrate the Scholars into campus life. I-House services for residents also include access to partially sponsored workshops and training on negotiating conflicts, designed to orient participants to the challenges and joys of intercultural exchange.

Resident Temperature Check

How Can We Make Your Experience Better?

Overall, how satisfied are you with your International House Experience?

Over the past nine decades, I-House staff have mastered the art of providing the highest quality service to generations of residents. Many current staff members have been with I-House for more than two decades, and know how to deliver compelling excellence through attention to details both small and large.

Executive Director Shaun Carver has instituted a weekly "temperature check" survey of residents to determine, through direct feedback, how well I-House is serving their needs, and to bring to light specific recommendations and concerns needing attention. Each Sunday morning, approximately one-sixth of the residents receive an invitation to provide their constructive input, followed each subsequent week by invitations to the next cohort so that every six weeks all residents are invited to participate.


Comments and suggestions received are shared directly with key staff, and overall rankings are shared and discussed weekly at the senior team meeting. Over time, this process will allow for benchmarking results year to year, fixing and anticipating recurring challenges, and attaining better and better quality outcomes in terms of the resident experience at I-House.

While issues raised are often known to staff and improvements may already be underway, it is of great importance to provide this feedback and satisfaction survey process for continuous improvement and responsiveness.

Once improvements are identified and implemented, specific responses to issues raised via the survey process are communicated to all residents. In this manner, the Executive Office and relevant teams such as Dining and Operations close the feedback loop and let residents know unequivocally that they are heard and that their concerns are



important. Working to deserve the recognition by residents that I-House management listens to concerns, acts to address them, and responds promptly is one of the ways in which we are striving to build community.



Global Community Rekindles I-House Memories and Uncovers New Talent

Just over a year ago, we launched the I-House Berkeley Connect platform as part of our *Global Community Initiative*. The timing was fortunate as it kept our alumni connected during the pandemic and our subsequent temporary closure. Since then, membership has grown to nearly 1,500 active users. This summer, we were delighted to invite the incoming residents to join—many of whom were eager to meet their fellow residents virtually—prior to the official move-in on August 19th.

The platform has become a hub where alumni and current residents can interact with each other; a forum for Shaun and staff to share relevant news with the community; and a fountain of fond memories from alumni shared through profiles and photos. An unexpected benefit is that some of our "lost alumni," for whom we didn't have contact info, are finding their way back to the I-House community. We've been able to clean up our database and improve our global reach!

Moreover, we've been able to scout fresh stories and talent to feature for special multimedia projects. An example of this is our latest I-House Memories compilation video with memories provided by users of the platform. The video highlights 52 of the responses, spanning from the 1960s until today.





Cue the music! When computer science major and pianist Allen Mao posted videos of himself playing classical music, little did he know this would lead to his music accompanying our memories video. We recorded him performing a classical medley on the Kawai grand piano in the Chevron Auditorium, the first time the piano has been played in two years!

We found out that Allen has a unique connection to I-House! He writes, "Fun fact: in the early 1980s, my father, **Dr. Weili Cheng (IH 1980)**, resided at the International House for a quarter (yes, back when Berkeley was on the quarter system), while pursuing his Ph.D. in mechanical engineering. Dr. Cheng was among the first group of students from mainland China to come to the USA after the normalization of ties between the PRC and the USA. Dr. Cheng found love across the Bay and married Allen's mother, a Stanford alum. Former UC Berkeley Chancellor Chang-Lin Tien attended the marriage."

the public yet to ensure the safety of our residents, but look forward to welcoming our alumni and community back to dine with us again soon. Additionally, we have increased the dining hours of operation to accommodate the lower number of seats, required masks at all times except when consuming meals, and all residents and staff entering the Eric and Wendy Schmidt Dining Commons must show their green daily clearance badge." These and a number of other guidelines have been implemented and are updated based on the parameters of the Centers for Disease Control, the State of California, and local and UC authorities for the safety of our community.

Traditionally, International House has provided a different mix of ethnic dishes every day. Our beautiful 2nd-floor Dining Room features rich wood tables, chandeliers, and a stage for special events. I-House meals feature all-you-caneat buffet-style salad bar, pasta bar, daily soup, and rotating



entrees. Menus change every day to bring a new culinary slice of the world. On any given day, diners might find traditional American fare next to dishes from multiple continents, with plates ranging from Chinese sesame noodles to tomatookra curry to Jamaican curried rice to old-fashioned minestrone soup.

Throughout the year, our students contribute recipes from their respective homelands to our menu during the course of the school session. We also prepare a number of Native American, Chicano-Latino, African American, European, and Asian-themed cultural meals to accompany major ethnic-heritage celebrations, often including Oktoberfest, Diwali, Lunar New Year, Persian New Year, among others.

International House recognizes that residents may have medically necessary or religious dietary restrictions, as well as varying food preferences. I-House offers a wide variety of food and drink selections, including items for those minimizing dairy, gluten, and/or meat products, subject to applicable health-code restrictions

In addition to dining, Cedric's hospitality team is responsible for events, large and small, catering

internal to I-House, for the broader campus community, and the beloved Café.

Staff Highlight Executive Chef Marie Abigail Serbins

Chef Marie Abigail Serbins has been on the cover of a Wheaties box, and achieved the prestigious Le Cordon Bleu classification from California Culinary Academy. She's been named Super Chef of the Year and ranked among the top 20 women chefs by the Compass Group. Chef Abbie won on the Food Network TV program Guy Fieri's Grocery Games, she was George Lucas's chef, and now she's Executive Chef at International House! Here are some excerpts of an interview conducted by I-House Social Media Ambassador Azza Chairannisa.

Why did you decide to work at I-House? What were some of your first impressions of the house?

The name International House really is what draws me into this realm of the world. First of all, it just defines who I am as a chef. I am trained internationally in typical cuisines, different cultural backgrounds, and stuff like that. So I thought, *oh, why not work there and share my passion for food.*

It's a beautiful place. You know, I felt really at home as soon as I stepped foot here and just getting to see different faces,

different cultures. That's what really draws me into being here, and I just feel so at home.

You've just started here; what does the Executive Chef of I-House do?

Oh, what does it mean? Well, I am in charge of the whole culinary department. Daily, I'm in charge of picking the best and the freshest ingredients for nurturing people.

This is a gathering place for everyone. When you're in school, you're so stressed and you just want to relax and unwind, kind of like coming home to Mom, you know. You just want to relax and be in the dining room and then find your favorite dish. So I think that would be a place where people go to as a sanctuary to unwind and relax, getting ready for the next semester, exam or whatnot, something that's very good.

Can you tell us about "spinning the globe" for inspiration in global cuisines?

One of my favorite awards is my medal when I graduated from the culinary school in San Francisco. So I've kept this for a very long time because it really defines a huge significance of why I became a chef, and there's a lot of backstory about it,



but with all of the hard work that I put in, finally, I graduated and I was so happy. I also have this globe with me that I had when I was at culinary school, almost 20 years ago. I carried this globe with me, and we did international studies of cuisine. And one of my chefs said, "You know, what really would hone you as a chef? You need to keep a globe in your kitchen and then you just spin it. Then you just put your finger on the globe with your eyes closed. That will be the dish that you're going to make for the day. I've been doing that for so long and I've kept it with me forever!

Manohar Apte (IH 1961-62) (left)




visited I-House along with his wife, Sheila, and daughter, Anjali M. Apte (IH 1992-93) (center), on the 60th anniversary

Kathryn M. Bailey (IH 1940s)

Beva P. Farmer (IH 1946)



Beva graduated from Carmel High School, then went to UC Berkeley, joining Alpha Phi and living at International House, She

met and married Peter Farmer; they had five children. Beva was an artist: calligrapher, painter, serigrapher, and other media.

Marlene De Lancie (IH 1948-50)



Marlene De Lancie studied mineral metabolism in healing bone fractures at UC Berkeley, using radioactive isotopes. While

living at I-House, she met Richard Henry De Lancie (IH 1949), her husband and fellow grad student. In 2001, Marlene was admitted to the San Mateo County Women's Hall of Fame and honored for her outstanding accomplishments and contributions. Marlene loved the daily paper, crossword puzzles, historical novels, PBS NewsHour, Rummikub, and most importantly, spending time with her six grandkids.

Te Piao King (IH 1947-50)



Te Piao King, a biochemist whose pioneering research greatly advanced the science and treatment of allergic

reactions, earned his undergraduate degree from UC Berkeley in 1950, and his Ph.D. from the University of Michigan in 1953. That same year, he joined the faculty of The Rockefeller University—then known as The Rockefeller Institute for Medical Research. King was a member of the American Society for Biochemistry and Molecular Biology, the American Academy of Allergy and Clinical Immunology, and the American Society of Biological Chemists.

1950s

Marcia Garbus Burnam (IH 1950)

In 2017, Marcia Burnam wrote, "My year (1950) at I-House is still the best year of my life!" Passionate about justice and interracial understanding, she was a groundbreaking leader in interreligious affairs, and was an outspoken voice against domestic violence. In the 1960s, she headed the Portraits of American Women panel. Marcia later served as National Vice President, capping three decades of dedication to the American Jewish Committee.



Ann Garfield (IH 1956)

Ann Garfield graduated from **UC** Berkeley with her teaching credential and M.A. in education from

San Francisco State. She was a special education teacher in the San Francisco Unified School District for over 40 years. In the early '60s, she bought a houseboat. She lived in it for almost 50 years. Ann had a great passion for activism and went on strikes for teachers. In her later years, Ann was an enthusiastic Gray Panther.

Noor A. Lakhdhir (IH 1950-52)



As Noor was a poor Muslim boy in Mumbai, his mother thought it would not be possible for him to study in America. But Noor surprised her and received

a scholarship to study at UC Berkeley, from which he graduated in 1952. He then moved to New York and continued his journey with International House, living in I-House New York. One of his jobs was at the International House New York Newsstand, where he met Ann who also lived at I-House New York. She would stop by the Newsstand every morning. Noor and Ann got married and had two children.

Henry Lurie (IH 1957-60)



Henry Lurie was a first-generation college student who obtained both his bachelor's and Ph.D. at UC Berkeley. Henry was awarded the University Medal as the highest-ranked graduating senior in

the class of 1957. He relocated to Los Angeles and started a long successful career at TRW, working on a number of important projects such as research and advanced space technologies. Henry was also a pioneer in helping design and develop the first artificial heart. In 1993, Henry was recognized as a Distinguished Engineering Alumni by the college.

Roy "Ruy" S. Portugal (IH 1955-56)

On a 6th-floor room-plaque dedication, Roy "Ruy" Santos Portugal wrote, "The International House nourished the knowledge, confidence, and experiences to start my career. May this house continue to provide worldwide connections and relationships for a peaceful world." Ruy was born in

New York city to Portuguese parents, and then moved to Brazil. After service in the U.S. Navy, he came to Berkeley and lived at I-House. Ruy graduated in 1956 from the Haas School of Business. He enjoyed returning to I-House for visits, Haas for events, and Memorial Stadium for games after his retirement to Napa.

David Shirley (IH 1953-62)



David Shirley served as director of Lawrence Berkeley National Laboratory and professor at UC Berkeley. He was a pioneer of electron spectroscopy, a

teacher, a mentor, and an extraordinary scientific leader with broad vision. David was mentored himself by Nobel Laureate, UC Chancellor, and I-House Board member Glenn Seaborg (IH 1934-35). After completing his doctorate here, David became a lecturer in chemistry at UC Berkeley in 1959 and then became chairman in 1968. He was a National Science Foundation fellow at Oxford University in 1966-67, was awarded the U.S. Atomic Energy Commission's Ernest Orlando Lawrence Award in 1972, was elected to the National Academy of Sciences in 1978, and received an honorary degree from the Free University of Berlin in 1987.

Ruth Ellen Smith (IH 1952-57)



Ruth Ellen Smith earned both a B.A. and M.A. from UC Berkeley and earned a Ph.D. in psychology from the University of Southern California. Dr. Smith worked

for most of her career as a clinical psychologist for the Porterville Developmental Center where she served as Staff Psychologist, Director of Research, and chair of several

committees. She served as a shortterm volunteer helping with English in Indonesia, Poland, Hungary, and Portugal. She also volunteered on archeology digs in Germany and Peru.

Millicent Tomkins (IH 1951)



Millicent Tomkins studied art and literature at UC Berkeley. Millicent made her professional concert debut as a soprano at the age of 30. She continued her

singing career for 20 more years and kept a number of small studios in which she developed her distinctive style of visual expression. Millicent Tomkins is remembered for her intense creative energy, her innate curiosity, and fine humor.

Nancy Francis (IH 1955-57)



Nancy Francis attended Wellesley College in Massachusetts for a year. After that, she moved to UC Berkeley and started living at I-House. At I-House, she

met the love of her life, a graduate student in physics from Kansas, Arthur Berrill Francis. Nancy graduated from UC Berkeley with a degree in Spanish language and was hired as a business language translator. She then obtained her teaching credential and became an elementary school teacher.

In the Eric and Wendy Schmidt Dining Commons, Nancy dedicated a plaque in the Service Station honoring her I-House experience.

In Memory

David Jenkins (IH 1960)



Remembered for being a "leading light" in his profession, UC Berkeley Professor Emeritus David Jenkins died March 6 at the age of 85. Jenkins

began his career in academia shortly after graduating from Kings College University of Durham, England, in 1960, with a Ph.D. in public health. In 1962, he joined UC Berkeley as an assistant professor in the department of civil engineering and eventually achieved full professor status in 1975, where he stayed until his retirement in 1999.

Jenkins was highly regarded around the world for his groundbreaking developments in wastewater treatment processes, according to a memorial written by his department colleagues. Through his craft, he was able to continue the notable legacy of his father, Samuel H. Jenkins, who was known for his contributions in cleaning up the River Thames and other polluted rivers.

Stephen D. Bechtel Jr.



Stephen D. Bechtel Jr. (known as Steve Jr.) was a global figure in business, public affairs, and philanthropy. He oversaw the company's growth into a world leader

in the construction industry, building iconic infrastructure on six continents and pioneering new technologies, engineering and construction methods. Active in civic affairs, he served on six presidential commissions for three U.S. presidents. In 1991, President George H.W. Bush awarded Steve. Jr. the nation's highest honor for technological achievement, the National Medal of Technology and Innovation. He also served in advisory roles at the California Institute of Technology, Purdue, MIT, Stanford, and the Hoover Institution.

In 1995, a gift from S.D. Bechtel, Jr., Royal Barney Hogan, and Bechtel Foundations supported high-speed internet connections in resident rooms and established an endowment to support resident orientations. The gift was recognized at one of our galas in the late '90s with other family members present. Several annual gifts from the Stephen Bechtel Jr. Foundation have been received in support of our financial aid program and annual fund efforts.

Mary Ann Mason (Former I-House **Board Member**)



Mary Ann Mason served as UC Berkeley's first female graduate dean and was a dynamic champion for gender equity and work-family balance in

academia. During Mason's distinguished two decades at UC Berkeley, she served as a professor of social welfare before ascending in 2000 to dean of the

Graduate Division, which serves some 10,000 students. While gathering data about graduate students, she discovered that, while half were female, women represented a much smaller percentage of Berkeley's tenure-track faculty.

Dean Mason was the Chairman of the International House Board of Directors Financial Aid Committee.

Michael Morgan (Former I-House **Board Member**)



Michael Morgan, trailblazer, former **Board Member** of I-House, and award-winning Music Director and Conductor of the Oakland East Bay Symphony, passed

away on August 20th.

I-House is grateful for Michael's service in support of our mission. A member of the Board Executive Committee, Chair of the Program Committee, and 1999 Gala Honoree among his many contributions, Michael also was a Campaign Leader for the I-House 75th Anniversary Capital Campaign.

Recognized as one of America's most talented conductors, in recent years, Mr. Morgan conducted the Berlin Radio Orchestra, the Rotterdam Philharmonic, the Philadelphia Orchestra, and the Los Angeles Philharmonic at the Hollywood Bowl. In a press release, Jim Hasler, the Oakland Symphony's Board Chair, reflected that "Michael built the foundations of an Oakland Symphony dedicated to diversity, education, artistic collaboration, and a celebration of music across genres and cultures."
