

Mustafa Yildiz, The 2016-2017 Rafael Rodriguez Golden Age Fellow at International House, UC Berkeley



My name is Mustafa Yildiz and I was born in Denizli, Turkey, to parents of civil servants who were themselves coming from families with a long tradition of viticulture. Growing up in a small town cherished with nature and history, I was always amazed by languages and medieval history from an early age.

As a BA student I studied Translation Studies at one of the best universities of Turkey, which equipped me with good command of English and French languages. When I decided to pursue an academic career, I switched my field to Byzantine history. For this

purpose, I heavily studied Ancient and Byzantine Greek.

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The Rafael Rodriguez Golden Age Fellowship was established in 1989, and serves as a model for the current Gateway Fellowship program. This fellowship was made possible by the generosity of I-House alumni from the "Golden Age" (1946-1952), who created the scholarship in honor of fellow alumnus Rafael Rodriguez of Costa Rica. The fund provides for a full room and board grant for for one entering graduate (Ph.D.) international student of great promise who may lack the financial resources to come to Cal and is deemed likely to benefit from, and contribute to, life at I-House. The recipient receives paid room and board fees for twelve months, a stipend from International House, and tuition and fees paid by the corresponding academic department for the first academic year. Recipients are selected annually by the Dean of UC Berkeley's Graduate Division after faculty input.
